BACK IN 2024

Australia's most remote and richest amateur golf series spanning an epic 1,650+ kilometres across Queensland's outback, the 2024 Outback Queensland Masters is set to return to Charleville in 2024. Staged over six consecutive weekends, 15 June – 21 July, the tour moves from Birdsville to Quilpie stopping in Charleville and offers \$10,000 hole-in-one challenges culminating with the million-dollar hole-in-one challenge in Quilpie. The competition attracts players from every state of Australia, some travelling some 10,000 km to compete in Queensland.

Charleville's Creative Lane 2023

Charleville's annual Creative Lane, organised by the Charleville Cultural Association, has been gaining popularity beyond the Shire's borders, so this year's looks to be bigger and better than ever. This year's event will take place on the 15th, 16th, and 17th of September, 2023 at the Cultural Centre, tucked behind the Mulgalands Gallery. With six expert tutors on board, the event will offer 217 workshop spaces and host 21 workshops in total. Exciting workshops await participants, including wood carving sessions with Theresa Darmody, barbed wire art by Grace Gray (Barbed Balls), Macrame with Elise Heather (Elise Heather Designs), Copper Foiling led by Michele Hollister (Mihardwork), soap and candle making by Felicity Aitken (Bloom into you by Felicity), and cake decorating and bread making classes with Janeen McIntyre (The Accidental Caker). 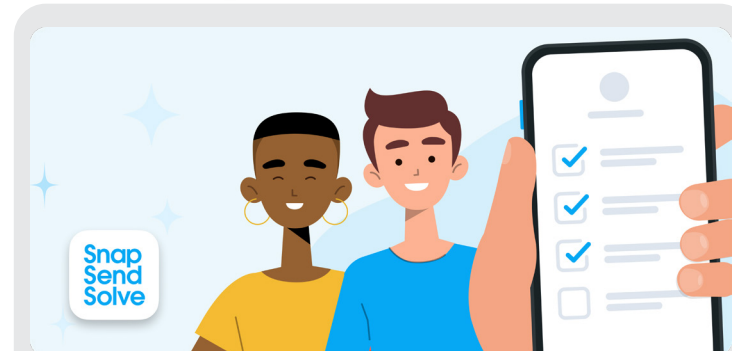

Delve into the Charming World at the AUGATHELLA EXPERIENCE

NESTLED IN THE HEART of Augathella, the newly constructed Augathella Experience immerses visitors in the rich history and captivating tales. From interactive touch screen displays to engaging stories on the walls, this unique attraction offers a journey through time that will delight both young and old.

At the heart of the Augathella Experience lies a cinema screen that showcases behind the scenes footage of the renowned Smiley movies. This endearing tale was based on the 1945 book by Moore Raymond, who, as a child, lived in Augathella and drew inspiration from his surroundings.

It tells the story of a young Australian boy who is determined to buy a bicycle for

four pounds. Along the way he gets into many misadventures. Moore Raymond also co-wrote the film with Anthony Kimmins. Their screenplay received a Best British Screenplay nomination at the BAFTA awards.

Nearly all of the cast were Australian and filming took place at a fictional township of Murrumbilla -- based on Augathella -- recreated on an estate at Camden Park, Gundy NSW.

Visitors can view the full length Smiley films at the Boadicea Cinema and Gallery located at the Rural Transaction Centre in Augathella.

The movie theatre within the Augathella Experience offers more than just the

Smiley Movies. Visitors can also indulge in a collection of short film documentaries, curated in collaboration with the Bidjara people, the traditional owners of the land. These films shed light on the rich cultural heritage and profound connection the Bidjara people have with the Augathella region.

The involvement of the Bidjara Elders in the planning of the Augathella Experience ensures a respectful and authentic representation of their traditions and contributions to the area.

The Augathella Experience would not have been possible without the generous funding from the Federal Government and the support from the Murweh Shire Council.

This project has been a long-time dream for the Augathella Progress Association, which first presented the idea years ago. To bring this vision to life, Link Interactive, a commissioned team with a personal connection to Augathella, having strong ties to Colin Peterson, the actor who played Smiley in the movies, joined forces to create an immersive experience that will capture the hearts and imaginations of all who visit.

Note: For those unfamiliar with the Smiley stories, the character Smiley is often compared to an Australian Huck Finn—a likable boy who stumbles into misadventures, capturing the hearts of audiences.

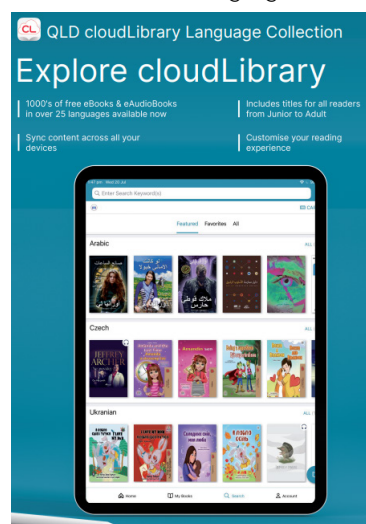

COULD YOU BE AN 'ON-CALL' FIREFIGHTER?

Help the community and get paid. It's a win-win.

WHAT ARE AUXILIARY FIREFIGHTERS AND WHAT DO THEY DO?

Auxiliary firefighters are casual on-call firefighters who respond to emergency situations when needed. They are members of local communities. Everyday people who balance their work, study and family commitments with the 'on-call' role of an auxiliary firefighter.

Our auxiliary firefighters respond to a wide variety of emergency incidents including structural and environmental fires, road accident rescue, swift water rescue, technical rescue and deliver community education.

WHAT DOES IT TAKE?

The role is both physically and mentally challenging. You'll need to be able to respond when required and be up for dealing with intense and sometimes confronting situations.

There will be periods of intense physical activity. You may need to wear breathing apparatus and protective clothing. You will be working in hot and humid environments and sometimes in confined spaces. You will be met with challenging situations, including dealing with casualties.

HOW TO APPLY?

Anyone who is currently an Australian or New Zealand citizen or Australian permanent resident, who has held a manual C class driver licence for at least a year OR holds a manual medium rigid driver licence and is at least 18 years of age can be an auxiliary firefighter.

You also need to have or be eligible for a BlueCard and live or work within a reasonable distance to an Auxiliary Fire Station so as you can quickly respond when required.

A variety of events captured the evening, with the highlight being the performance

of the 30 year anniversary of Slim Dusty’s beloved song ‘Charleville’ performed by his son David Kirkpatrick and his band Two Tone Pony. Robbie Mortimer joined in for a thrilling duet.

The audience was captivated by the heartfelt tribute, reminiscing the timeless charm of the iconic song. Their performances set a euphoric mood, with festival attendees swaying to the music, lost in the rhythm and melody.

The night was lit up with the mesmerising display of the Fire Drums that illuminated the darkness and cast dancing shadows around the festival. Additionally, the classic car show was a sight to behold, showcasing sleek and vintage vehicles, much to the delight of the automobile enthusiasts present.

But it was the spirited Cooeee Competition that drew roars of laughter and cheers from the spectators, making it an event to remember.

The festival grounds were alive during the day two. The pavilion was bustling with a lively market, offering an array of local products and crafts.

From dusk till dawn, the Half Way There Shindig was more than just a music festival. It was a celebration of community spirit, an homage to the town’s cultural vibrancy, and a testament to the unifying power of music.

Mayor Shaun (Zoro) Radnedge Unveils Fiscally Responsible Budget to Foster Community Growth

THE MAYOR of Murweh Shire, Shaun (Zoro) Radnedge, proudly presented the Shire's 23/24 budget, reflecting a robust financial plan focused on responsible spending and community development. With a total budget of \$54 million, excluding depreciation of \$7.3 million (representing 20% of Council's total expenditure), this year's budget is a testament to the Shire's commitment to prudent financial management.

Mayor Radnedge expressed his enthusiasm for the budget, stating, "This budget is a sound plan to support the growth and well-being of our community. With the support of state and federal grants, we will continue to invest in projects and make Murweh a better place to live and work for our residents and visitors."

The funding for this year's budget is sourced from a diverse range of revenue streams, including both rating and non-rating sources. Notably, capital and operating grants from federal and state government sources have played a vital role in bolstering the Shire's financial resources. The Council actively pursues these funding opportunities to support community projects and initiatives.

To ensure the smooth functioning of essential services, there will be an average increase of 7% in rates and utility charges. Across the board this reflects an average 5% rate rise across all sectors. The pensioner remission will rise by \$20 to \$400 for the year. Additionally, the interest on rates will experience a moderate increase from 8.17% to 11.64%.

Recognising the importance of investing in infrastructure, the budget allocates approximately \$25.1 million for capital expenditure. Leveraging Queensland and Federal Government grants and subsidies, which amount to \$18.7 million, the Council will contribute \$4.8 million towards capital projects. Notably, 73% of the total capital expenditure will be dedicated to new or upgraded assets, while the remaining 27% will be allocated to the renewal of existing assets.



In line with prudent financial management, the Council will allocate \$211,118 towards existing loans, reaffirming its commitment to reducing debt. Furthermore, the Council does not plan to borrow in the new financial year, ensuring a stable financial outlook.

Murweh Shire Council Takes a Stand for Responsible Dog Ownership and Community Safety

IN AN EFFORT to promote responsible dog ownership and ensure the safety and harmony of the community, the Murweh Shire Council have taken a stand on enforcing local laws concerning our furry companions.

The council is emphasising several crucial rules that every dog owner must follow. To maintain a balanced environment, the town's residential areas permit a maximum of two dogs per property. Additionally, all dogs over three months old are required to be registered annually. For those who choose to desex and microchip their dogs, there's an attractive lifetime registration option with a one-time fee of \$25.00. This move not only keeps track of all dogs but also contributes to curbing the number of unwanted dogs in the region.

A growing concern in the Shire has been the presence of dogs wandering around freely, resulting in various complaints and incidents. To address this issue, the council has taken a tough stance, allowing council officers to impound any dog found wandering at large. To retrieve pets the owners must pay the impoundment fees.

Furthermore, Council is taking a proactive approach to deal with dogs that have attacked or caused fear to residents. Such dogs may be declared dangerous, leading to stricter measures to ensure the community's safety.

In a recent press release, Council highlighted that responsible pet ownership went beyond mere compliance with the law; it was a moral obligation to the community. Recent incidents of dogs attacking and causing disturbances, even impacting mail deliveries, had underscored the importance of being responsible and considerate dog owners.

The State Government had launched a significant initiative, "Strong Dog Laws: Safer Communities," seeking public consultation to gauge support for more robust dog regulations. The Mayor Radnedge called upon all residents to actively participate in the survey, stating, "While we all adore our dogs, some can pose serious dangers. We've witnessed unfortunate incidents involving attacks on community members and even council workers. Now was the time for us to have our say and contribute to making our communities safer."

Residents could access the discussion paper and provide feedback through the official website until midnight on Thursday, 24 August 2023.

Taking the lead in responsible dog ownership and active participation in

shaping stronger dog laws, Murweh Shire Council is determined to create a secure and harmonious environment for everyone. For further information on Council Dog Laws or to pay your dog registration please head to the Murweh Shire Website – Animals.

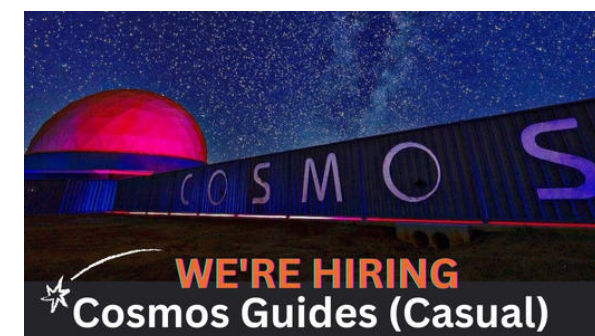
The success of the first “Made it to Morven” night has left everyone eagerly looking forward to more celebrations like this, as it is a testament to Morven’s vibrant spirit.

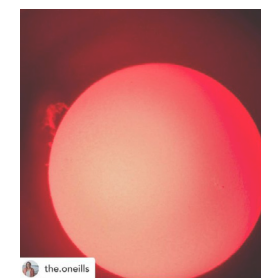

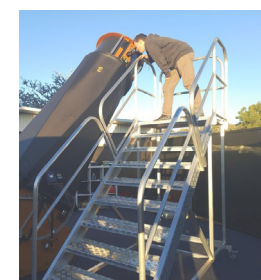
