SENIORS WEEK A HUGE HIT


The annual event is often filled with lots of laughter and good times. This year's was no different.



Girls from the Ville Rally Home Last month the famed outback car rally, the Mystery Box Rally, putted and splutted into Charleville. The mystery box



Beyond the exhilarating journey and the vibrant community spirit, the Mystery Box Rally was deeply rooted in a noble cause. Since its inceptions, the Cancer Council as benefited greatly from the event's immense success. With the rallying cry to raise \$1 million, at time of writing, the rally had raised well over a million thanks in no small part to two Charleville locals who partook in the rally. Under the name of the "Girls from the Ville", Bettsy Murphy and Leith Brennan raised a staggering \$35,800 for the Cancer Council.

OUTBACK MASTER'S RETURNS IN 2024

Following the excitement of the 2,800-kilometre golfing adventure of this year's Outback Queensland Masters, locations for Australia's most remote and amateur golf series in 2024 were announced and Charleville will once again host a leg of this prestigious and popular event. Since its inception in 2019, the Outback Queensland Masters has gone from strength to strength, generating millions of dollars in visitor spend for the remote communities of Outback Queensland, and in 2022 generated 13,062 visitor nights and contributed \$1.89M to the Queensland economy.





BILBY DAY

Often called Australia's version of the Easter Bunny, the Bilby has lived harmoniously with Aboriginal people across 70 percent of Australia for 60,000 years.

Charleville Hosts Darling Downs Southwest Queensland Regional Community Forum

A FEW WEEKS AGO, Charleville hosted Darling Downs Southwest Queensland Regional Community Forum, the third such forum of 2023. Housing, health, education, training and employment pathways, infrastructure, economic diversification, and the Q2032 Procurement Strategy for regional Queensland was on the table for discussion

The forum was attended by community members, local dignitaries as well as Minister for Education, Minister for Industrial Relations and Minister for Racing Grace Grace, and Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner. The forum was co-chaired by the State Member for Ipswich Jennifer Howard MP and the State Member for Ipswich West Jim Madden MP.

Forum members visited Charleville's WWII Secret Base and an agricultural showcase including a shearing demonstration and a presentation on agriculture, land management and conservation innovation.

Presentations to forum members included an overview on the Southern Queensland Rural Health Centre Clinical Training Facility, and the establishment of the Southwest Primary Health Alliance.

There was also a presentation about the Q2032 Procurement Strategy whereby Queensland-based businesses will be prioritised to share in an anticipated \$180 billion in government procurement from now until the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. By all accounts, the forum was a success, said the Mayor of Charleville, Shaun (Zoro) Radnedge.

"Everyone enjoyed themselves and a lot of good came out of the forum for our region."











Racing Returns to Charleville

Minister Grace said that the Government had invested heavily to ensure the track was world-class and she was excited to see racing return to Charleville, saying she would return for the big day. "It's fantastic to see that racing will soon return to Charleville," said the Minister. The Mayor of Charleville, Shaun (Zoro) Radnedge, said the return of racing was a very positive event for the town and the region. "Racing is a major event in Charleville for lots of reasons. It's a great place to socialise, have a few drinks with friends, maybe meet some new ones. It's an



important part of county life, so its return is great news," said the Mayor. Local racing will began on the 1st of October with the official opening day coming on the 28th of October. Make Sure you turn up for a big party.

State Government Grant Allows Griffith University and EarthCheck to Foster Sustainable Travel and Tourism in Murweh Shire

EARLIER THIS YEAR, the Queensland Government provided Murweh Shire with a financial grant to establish itself as a Sustainable Destination – one of only 14 Shires across Queensland to receive this grant. Through a strategic partnership with Griffith University and EarthCheck Australia, Murweh Shire now has the opportunity to engage with EarthCheck. This exclusive program serves as Australia's sole global benchmarking and certification initiative focused on promoting sustainable practices within the realm of travel and tourism. It's important to note that this program holds official recognition and accreditation from the highly-regarded Global Sustainable Tourism Council (GSTC).

EarthCheck offers a set of guidelines intended to bring key stakeholders together to achieve common sustainability outcomes. The EarthCheck Program serves as a tool for us to review our performance as a Council and Shire against specific criteria, such as energy, water, air quality, waste, cultural sites, and social and economic factors related to transport and tourism.

The primary objective of the EarthCheck Program is to facilitate responsible and sustainable Environmental, Cultural, Social, and Economic (ECSE) outcomes for destinations.

These outcomes align with the aims and objectives outlined in the Shire Corporate Plan (2021-2025) and Operational Plan (2022-23) for a sustainable future for the Shire.

The EarthCheck Program provides a framework to benchmark our ECSE performance and identify avenues for continuous improvement. This program can be used to support our vision for the Shire, as well as to focus on sound policy and action plans that contribute to achieving that vision.

The Program is designed to empower our local community to take ownership of sustainability goals and build on local initiatives. The program recognises the benefits of community collaboration in achieving sustainable outcomes.

The project will be managed by a Project Coordinator from Griffith University, who will closely collaborate with Council and representatives from four areas of the Shire: Business, Community, Council, and Environment – specifically, the Sustainability Team.

EARTHCHECK

Promoting Responsible Animal Ownership in *Our Community*







Get ready to learn about responsible animal ownership!
These guidelines, aligned with the Council's Local Law for
Keeping of Animals, are here to help us create a happy balance
between our beloved pets and our wonderful community.

Here are the key points to note:

- Proper Identification: Ensure that each animal under your care is adequately identified with your contact details, including name, address, and telephone number.
- 2. Waste Water Management: Properly manage waste waters from enclosures to avoid inconvenience to others. Keep runoff away from neighboring properties or follow guidance from authorized personnel.
- 3. Waste Collection: Collect excreta, food scraps, and any potentially offensive materials daily. If not immediately removed, store them in an authorized waste container.
- **4. Enclosure Maintenance:** Maintain animal enclosures to be both clean and sanitary. Additionally, ensure they are visually acceptable to the community.
- 5. Noise Management: Make every effort to prevent your pets from causing noise disturbances. This includes limiting:
- Noise for more than a total of 6 minutes from 7:00 AM to 10:00 PM.
- Noise for more than a total of 3 minutes in any 30-minute period after 10:00 PM or before 7:00 AM.
- Adequate Space: Ensure that the area available to your pets on your premises is appropriately sized for their effective and comfortable housing.

Requirements for Proper Enclosures:

A proper enclosure must be appropriately sized to house your animal comfortably and effectively.

The enclosure must be suitably fenced, considering the species and breed of your animal. The fence should effectively enclose the animal at all times.

Suitably fenced means the fence must:

- Be made of strong enough materials to prevent the animal from escaping.
- Be of sufficient height to prevent jumping or climbing.
- Include barriers to prevent digging or climbing.
- Have closed and latched gates, except when in immediate use.

Consequences of Non-Conformance:

Failure to adhere to these guidelines may lead to an authorized Council officer cancelling an approved excess dog permit. As an animal owner, you would then be required to remove all excess animals within seven days of receiving Council's notice.

We believe that responsible animal ownership benefits both pets and our community, ensuring a peaceful and enjoyable living environment for everyone. Let's work together to create a community where pets are cherished members and harmonious living is a priority.

Feral Animal Control Program

Council will be undertaking a Feral Animal Control Program, commencing on Monday 15 November and concluding on Monday 20 November 2023.

This program will assist with the control of feral cats, foxes, pigs and wild dogs on your property. Council is implementing processes that will reach out to all rural properties within the area, providing an opportunity for landholders to participate, together with up-dating information on its database, so as contact can be made much quicker than sending surface mail. Feral animals



may have a direct impact on livestock and production and by carrying disease onto and around your property. Council would like to work collaboratively with its landholders to reduce these known risks.

Please note that you must be in attendance at the baiting station to sign for your ordered meat, and to provide the pilot with direction as to where baits are to be dropped. There will be no treatment of meat at any of the baiting stations, due to the change in legislation where all treatment of meat is by injection only. Should any landholder want to have meat treated, is to be organised by making contact with an administration officer of Council on 4656 8355.

1-5 tonne per load \$61.00 plus gst

5-8 tonne per load \$80.00 plus gst

Over 8 tonne per load \$142.00 plus gst

Contaminated soil

(low level contamination) \$45.00 per tonne plus gst

Oil inceptor sludge and grease trap sludge \$0.05 cents per litre or part thereof plus gst

Asbestos \$135.00 per cubic metre no gst

Since October 22, a contractor has overseen operations at the Charleville waste facility, orchestrating a significant site cleanup in the process. Exciting changes are on the horizon, including the implementation of a ring road that will enhance user experiences and bolster safety by diverting residents away from the active disposal area.

As part of an ongoing site improvement initiative, the transition program is in full swing, with plans for future site enhancements to create a greener environment. However, please take note that Morven and Augathella sites are unmanned. To ensure proper waste management, the Council kindly requests that construction and demolition waste, along with commercial and industrial waste, be directed to the Charleville facility.



Cattle Travelling the Stock Route

Council currently has 3100 head of cattle walking on the stock route network - Augathella and Morven areas. Motorists are advised to take care when travelling within the Shire. The cattle at times will be on the roadway or on the road verge, slow down and drive through the mob slowly. Do not overtake within the middle of the mob of cattle, as the animal/s may become confused and cause an accident. There will be signs to advise that cattle are walking on the road, slow down as there maybe drovers working dogs in the grass that you do not see immediately. The stock will only be on the road in daylight hours, however if the animals get a fright whilst yarded at night, they maybe on the highway. If the signs are out to alert traffic of stock on the road, please slow down in this area. Stock will be supervised at all times.

September 23:

Spring Equinox

The equinoxes are a day where daylight and night time are of equal length and is an astronomical event that signifies the onset of fall (autumn) in the Northern Hemisphere and the arrival of spring in the Southern Hemisphere. On the day of the equinox, the Sun appears to rise "due east" and set "due west".

October 20 - 21:

The Orionid meteor shower peaks

On around 20-21 October 2023, you should be able to see up to 20 meteors per hour. Orionid meteors are brief streaks of light emitted by plasma created as dust impacts the Earth's upper atmosphere at a speed of 66 kilometres per second. To spot the Orionids, look toward the constellation Orion.

October 24:

Moon, Jupiter, and Saturn visible

The moon and the two gas giants the most impressive sights in the night's sky and appear in the sky early in the evening, perfect for viewing on Cosmos tours.

Oasis in Space – Planetarium Film

Oasis in Space will take you on a rich and fascinating journey through our celestial neighborhood, as we look for one of organic life's key ingredients – liquid water.


